Year 10 RE Curriculum Overview

Rationale: GCSE RE is studied by all students in Year 10. Lessons are timetabled 3 times per fortnight. The Year 10 RE curriculum continues to follow the EDUQAS route A full course specification. Studying this GCSE provides students with opportunities to understand more about the world, the religious challenges it faces and their place within it. It aims to deepen understanding of religions and their effect on society and develops learners' competence in a wide range of skills and approaches enabling students to become religiously informed, thoughtful and engaged citizens. The GCSE is split into 3 components: 1. Religious, Philosophical and Ethical Studies in the Modern World 2. The study of Christianity 3. The study of a world faith (Islam). Students will study the remaining 3 topics from each component during the course of this year building on the knowledge and skills developed during Year 9. Students will then spend time reviewing each topic and applying their knowledge and skills to exam questions in to support them in their preparation for the final exam. Students will sit 2 Mock exams during Year 10, in October and February.
