

Year 8 History Curriculum Overview

Rationale: The Year 8 curriculum is designed to give students an understanding of British history from 1500 through to 1900. They will explore the most interesting topics from this period with a focus on the Reformation and the religious wars which followed, looking at topics such as Bloody Mary, the reign of Elizabeth I and the English Civil War. From 1750 to 1900 we will look at the modernising industrial age with a focus on political and social reform. Students will develop their capacity to analyse sources and produce extended pieces of enquiry based writing.

<u>Autumn 2</u>	The wars over religion continue this term with Elizabeth I returning England to the Protestant faith and attempts by Catholics to return England to the old religion. We also begin looking at the English Civil War under the Stuarts who ruled England following the death of Elizabeth I in 1603, which led to Charles I's execution and the Interregnum under Oliver Cromwell.
